- And the Towards Learning PC Jack can work towards meeting standards in this category by accepting ownership and esconsibility for his mistakes. He has the desire to learn, he just needs to focus on correction not blame. This will continue to be accepted by the coach officer whenever it occurs and corrected immediately.
- Federal Statutes PC Jack will need to invest some of his time in studying the elements of criminal offences and his arrest authorities and procedures. At each call for service that provides the opportunity, these elements will be discussed to ensure that PC and is aware of the circumstances and what options are available. While enroute to calls, he and his coach still develope a game plant that the call based on dispatch information alone.
- This will few directly from his increased knowledge of Federal and Provincial Statutes as he will learn what questions to ask to help complete his investigation. When time permits, he can plan ahead and tell his coach officer what things he will be asking at the calls and what he plans to do with the information. He needs to avoid memorizing steps and listening to the information given to him through his questions.
- (4) Radio Communications PC Jack will be monitored closely to ensure that he advises the dispatcher of every stop that he makes and what he is doing. It will continue to be pointed out to him by his coach officer if he ever misses hearing the radio.
- (5) Decisive Insight PC Jack needs to make his best efforts at using common sense. Role playing ahead of time prior to attending calls can assist in this somewhat, and he will continue to be steered away from attempting to memorize calls and locations.
- (6) Analytical Thinking As mentioned in the Oral category, as he improves with his knowledge of Federal Statutes, it flows that his thinking will improve as well. He will continue to discuss his thoughts and ideas with his coach officer when possible and avoid asking for the answer from his coach officer.
- (7) Resolution PC Jack will continue to be forced to make decisions at calls. When he often shys away from making the decision and asks for the answer, he will me made to think on his own and develop a plan. Again, when time permits, these plans will be reviewed before and after the calls to determine their effectiveness.
- (8) Personal Accountability No specific action step other than observing that other tasks are completed. It flows that if attempts are made to correct the problems and the steps are completed than the accountability will meet requirements.
- (9) Flexibility As the fall months are slower than the summer. PC Jack will have an opportunity again at a slower pace to show he can multitask. He will have discussions with his coach officer about calls for service each day and why he chooses to do one over the other. He will also be asked to start each day with a plan of what he wants to accomplish.
- (10) Respectful Relations PC Jack has to commit to himself that he will not answer shop and not blame others for his mistakes. He needs to commit to accepting responsibility for his actions. Once this is done, he will gain the trust of those he has spurned in the past.
- (11) Self-Confidence PC Jack will have to continue to just trust his cwn instincts. He needs to gain confidence in order for most of the other areas to show improvement. He is trying hard not to fail, and as a result is hesitant to make mistakes. This is a natural part of learning and he needs to accept that he will make errors, but they can be corrected with work.

Coach Officers and Accountable Supervisors have responsibilities associated with the day-to-day coaching, development and supervision of the Probationary Constable utilizing the Recruit Field Training Manual.

All completed PCS 066P documents are to be sent to the Career Development Bureau after Regional Command comments and signatures are obtained.

Ontario Public Service (OPS) policy requires every OPS employee to have an annual Performance Development Plan (PDP) and Learning and Development Plan. The Probationary Constable Evaluation form, in conjunction with the Constable position description constitutes the PDP for OPP Constables while on probation. This form specifies the criteria by which the performance of Probationary Constables is evaluated and establishes the basis for recommending (or not) a change from probationary to permanent status.

The Recruit Field Training Manual is the generic Performance Evaluation Plan for Probationary Constables. At no point did PC Jack ask about the status of the grandpa and whether or not he was injured. This was concerning to his coach officer as PC Jack had just been reprimanded for doing the exact same thing on his previous shift. He had been given direction about not laying this type of charge as the courts would not proceed with them. PC Jack was asked how he could he be doing this again with the same charge — he was asked if he hadn't learnt something from the previous call and said he needed to think for a moment. It was clear that PC Jack was uncertain what to do with the occurrence. His coach officer had to tell him his options and then have him decide. PC Jack also told the father that they could have a no alcohol condition placed on their son. His coach told PC Jack that he needed to correct this statement because he had told them incorrect information. PC Jack denied saying it this way but just prior to leaving the father asked how they could get the condition added that PC Jack had talked about — PC Jack's coach explained to the complainant that the information was incorrect and they apologized. He wanted to make sure the police weren't at their home for something that was wrong. PC Jack was trying to tell the male to move in front of the cruiser for his safety but the male did not understand and continued with his story. It was clear that everything was fine and the male started to walk back to his car when PC Jack told him to wait so he could talk him. His coach officer told PC Jack that everything was fine and PC Jack said he didn't have all the details about what was going on. His coach officer told PC Jack to just let the male leave but PC Jack proceeded to exit the cruiser - he came back shortly and said that he just wanted to move the male between or in front of the cars because it was safer as he had been taught. His coach agreed that this was correct however because he was unable to explain what he wanted in the first place to the man, the man had already given PC Jack all the information. PC Jack had made the situation worse - in 20 seconds his coach explained to PC Jack everything that the man said. PC Jack had not heard any of this because he was so focussed on trying to have the man move instead of ending the whole situation quickly. WRITTEN Meets Requirements Expresses self clearly and concisely in writing. Documents information accurately in a timely manner and includes all necessary information that is required for reports utilizing electronic forms such as RMS. Specific example: PC Jack still writes very detailed occurrence reports for the calls he attends. His note taking has been watched and has improved. On 08DEC09 PC Jack attended a domestic dispute call. As a result of the call a male party was arrested and held for a bail hearing. PC Jack did good job at writing the crown brief synopsis - SP09276374.

LISTENING SKILLS

Meets Requirements

Specific example:

PC Jack pays very close attention to people when he is listening to their responses and instructions. His difficulties are still discussed under Oral where he still has trouble putting the information together into something useful and then repeating it to others.

On 16NOV09 PC Jack attended an address in Apsley to assist at a domestic dispute call. He assisted the investigating officer by taking a detailed statement and ensured the victim was being looked after appropriately -SP09266064.

On 19NOV09 PC Jack met with Sergeant Butorac and his coach officer for a progress review PC Jack discussed some of his struggles and advised that he felt he would be fine if he was by himself and not under the pressure of being with his coach. It was re-iterated to him that stress and pressure were parts of the job and he needed to be able to perform under these situations as well. PC Jack commented how he forwards emails and work to his house so he can work on them without distraction claiming that there is always too much going on around him at the office and pressure to be out on the road. The example mentioned under Decisive Insight is useful here as well - when things got stressful in that situation, PC Jack drove the cruiser directly towards the ditch as opposed to the driveway of the residence.

On 24NOV09 PC Jack attended a collision scene in which a truck had gone off the road into a ditch. PC Jack advised he wanted to gather all the information and that he had all the documents. He was told to go sit in the cruiser and complete forms while his coach would assist with removal of vehicle. He was also told to call the sergeant in regards to the ministry of environment (MOE). After some time, he was checked on by his coach officer for an update. PC Jack advised that the MOE had called but he told them to call back as he had no information and was busy with statements. His coach officer confirmed with him that he already knew about the spill as they had discussed this prior to him starting his reports. PC Jack and his coach officer then switched spots so PC Jack could be near the actual scene. PC Jack was indecisive with what he needed to do and claimed he misunderstood instructions on where to park cruiser to the block road, etc. He was also talked to about why he wouldn't interrupt his coach to change positions as the MOE call was more important than a witness statement.

- (1) Attitude Towards Learning PC Jack can work towards meeting standards in this category by accepting ownership and responsibility for his mistakes. He has the desire to learn, he just needs to focus on correction not blame. This will continue to be addressed by the coach officer whenever it occurs and corrected immediately.
- (2) Federal Statutes PC Jack will need to invest some of his time in studying the elements of criminal offences and his arrest authorities and procedures. At each call for service that provides the opportunity, these elements will be discussed to ensure that PC Jack is aware of the circumstances and what options are available. While enroute to calls, he and his coach still develope a game plan of how to handle the call based on dispatch information alone.
- (3) Police Vehicle Operation PC Jack is continuing remedial driver training with Sgt. Kent Taylor of GHQ.
- (4) Oral PC Jack will need to focus more closely on hearing exactly what things are being said by the people he is speaking with. This will flow directly from his increased knowledge of Federal and Provincial Statutes as he will learn what questions to ask to help complete his investigation. When time permits, he can plan ahead and tell his coach officer what things he will be asking at the calls and what he plans to do with the information. He needs to avoid memorizing steps and listening to the information given to him through his questions.
- (5) Radio Communications PC Jack will be monitored closely to ensure that he advises the dispatcher of every stop that he makes and what he is doing. It will continue to be pointed out to him by his coach officer if he ever misses hearing the radio.
- (6) Decisive Insight PC Jack needs to make his best efforts at using common sense. Role playing ahead of time prior to attending calls can assist in this somewhat, and he will continue to be steered away from attempting to memorize calls and locations.
- (7) Analytical Thinking As mentioned in the Oral category, as he improves with his knowledge of Federal Statutes, it flows that his thinking will improve as well. He will continue to discuss his thoughts and ideas with his coach officer when possible and avoid asking for the answer from his coach officer.
- (8) Resolution PC Jack will continue to be forced to make decisions at calls. When he often shys away from making the decision and asks for the answer, he will me made to think on his own and develop a plan. Again, when time permits, these plans will be reviewed before and after the calls to determine their effectiveness.
- (9) Personal Accountability No specific action step other than observing that other tasks are completed. It flows that if attempts are made to correct the problems and the steps are completed than the accountability will meet requirements.
- (10) Flexibility As the fall months are slower than the summer, PC Jack will have an opportunity again at a slower pace to show he can multitask. He will have discussions with his coach officer about calls for service each day and why he chooses to do one over the other. He will also be asked to start each day with a plan of what he wants to accomplish.
- (11) Respectful Relations PC Jack has to commit to himself that he will not answer shop and not blame others for his mistakes. He needs to commit to accepting responsibility for his actions. Once this is done, he will gain the trust of those he has spurned in the past.
- (12) Self-Confidence PC Jack will have to continue to just trust his own instincts. He needs to gain confidence in order for most of the other areas to show improvement. He is trying hard not to fail, and as a result is hesitant to make mistakes. This is a natural part of learning and he needs to accept that he will make errors, but they can be corrected with work.

His coach officer explained the need to ensure there was someone home to look after the boy. PC Jack then admitted that he did not intend on making sure the intoxicated male was looked after by his parents.

On 17OCT09 at the start of the shift, PC Jack advised there was a traffic complaint to go to but it was ten minutes old - a vehicle was tailgating and passing unsafely. He then said he had to do a log-on sheet because dispatch didn't have one and had asked for one. He then headed to shift briefing and appeared very stressed. He informed OIC Postma that the log-on was not done - he was advised to leave it for now and it would be sorted out by Postma as 4 people were off. PC Jack just sat there and stared at the table appearing frustrated. When briefing was over he advised of another traffic complaint which involved threats - someone gave another person the finger. He was asked if there was a plate and description and he confirmed there was so it was suggested that they leave and look for the vehicle. He got upset saying that he had to do the log-on and raised his voice at his coach - he was told to relax as it was not a big deal, he could just ask someone else to do the log-on sheet. Within 30 seconds PC Postma walked back in and asked PC Jack to do the log-on before he left if he had the time and told him three times what to log people on as including himself. PC Jack became frustrated and started muttering things under his breath about being asked to do two things at once. He finished the log-on and walked outside. His coach then took a call from PCC and the dispatcher said the log-on was all messed up - people were logged on as different zones and numbers as what she had been told by Postma verbally earlier. His coach corrected the errors and spoke with PC Jack - he again became quite angry advising that he heard Postma's instructions but no one can be expected to handle three things at once - his coach explained that a log-on sheet and two traffic complaints were minor tasks, and that he wasn't doing them at the same time, he just needed to prioritize them - he said it was impossible and that he couldn't be expected to start assessing and formulating a plan for one thing and then have to switch to another - he was to die take a breather and start over. He said he had no idea what to do so he and his coach sorted out what he had heard with the traffic complaints. His coach then called back to dispatch to confirm and there were more details that he had left out. It was explained to him about why he has difficulties listening, hearing, etc because he only gave partial information to his coach. On 27OCT09 there was a call on the radio where night shift was looking for a stolen vehicle -PC Folz advised he had two people under arrest at Airport Road by the train tracks - PC Jack was advised of the information and he told his coach he had heard. He did not appear to be in any type of hurry to assist his coworkers - PC Jack was told by his coach they would be attending and PC Pitts confirmed he was leaving at the same time. His coach had to repeat the location to PC Jack three times prior to even leaving the parking lot. He was encouraged to move faster so he could help his partners and all it did was slow him down. He appeared very confused and could not deal with the lack of information on the call - he wanted more details than just "go there to help the officers". As the pressure was increased, his stress increased, and everything just slowed down. Since he did not have a detailed set of facts to start off with, it caused PC Jack to become confused, frustrated, and upset over what to do with the call.

Specific example

As with Provincial Statutes, PC Jack appears to have a working knowledge of the offences that he has encountered this month. His difficulty lies with converting that book knowledge into practice on the road. He appears very hesitant with making the choice to proceed with an arrest or a charge. Of the situations that were encountered this month, there was only one that resulted in an arrest.

On 23SEP09 he was dispatched to an unwanted person call. Upon arriving at the residence he began speaking with the complainant who had met PC Jack previously. The complainant was seeking advice on what options he had and also what he wanted the officers to do. After some time the complainant brought the unwanted person to the door. It was apparent quickly that due to his intoxicated state that he could not stay at the residence with the complainant. Up until the point that the suspect started to walk away from PC Jack, he made no indication as to how he was going to resolve the situation. As the suspect started to leave, the coach officer told PC Jack to arrest the male and he would be coming with police. At the time of the arrest, search, or transport to detachment, the male was never read his rights to counsel. When this was discussed afterwards with PC Jack, he advised that he didn't do it because he didn't think he had to for a Prevent Breach of Peace arrest, and then said it was because his coach pressured him to proceed quickly with the arrest. As the issue of forgetting rights to counsel and caution was raised in prior evaluations, it appears that this stills needs some correction as it happened on the first arrest with the new coach officer.

When questioned as to why he didn't stop to speak with the youth, PC Jack advised that he wasn't thinking in a police officer mind set he was told that he was working the full 12 hours and that he needs to be able to multitask he cause he is talking doesn't mean he can't stop to deal with an offence.

He will get focused on one task or assignment and not be able to think about proactive things until he has the first completed. He decided to attend the residence and determined that no one was home. He then proceeded to call the dispatcher and have her call the complainant to attend and gather her belongings. The coach officer stopped this and asked PC Jack why he would have someone come to get their belongings alone without being able to ensure they didn't take the homeowners' property. He blamed his lack of judgement on other officers he worked with saying he thought he had seen them do that before at a stand by. When he was asked to explain the circumstances of that call, it was clear that it was not a similar incident and he agreed that the details were different.

He advised that he had never done this before, which was a surprise given he was at the 8 month mark on the road. He was shown where to locate the form and advised to attempt to fill in the blanks. He then brought it back for review and there were two minor errors pointed out. Upon hearing this, PC Jack advised that when another officer showed him before how to do the form that he said it was okay the way he had done it. PC Jack was advised immediately that answer shopping was one of his problem areas and it would not be tolerated. He was advised that he could not set up his coach or other officers by asking questions that he already knew the answers to just to point out that he had been taught differently. He was also told that lying and blaming other officers was unacceptable. PC Jack apologized and said it wouldn't happen again.

Since that day, it has been daily that something will come up where PC Jack attempts to ask questions that he already knows the answer to. On 19SEP09 he asked his coach how to sign a ticket because he didn't know the correct way to sign. He advised on 15SEP09 that he did not know how to start off his notebook as he had never been taught. It was explained in both instances to him that it couldn't be true that he hadn't been shown these basic tasks. It was pointed out again that it was clear that he was not being truthful just to see if this coach officer would give a different answer so that he could blame the other officer. He was told that his coach officer was not going to play games with him and PC Jack smiled. It was apparent that PC Jack knew that his coach officer had figured out what he was attempting to do.

On 09SEP09 at the start of shift PC Jack was advised of a pending threats call. He was asked to call the dispatcher for details. Upon returning to his coach, he advised that there were three calls outstanding and he had taken details on a stolen vehicle. He was advised to call back and get all three call details, and then prioritize which one to deal with first. He returned to advise that the threats call was not in his zone. It was explained how with only three day shift officers working for the first hour of the day, he would be taking calls in every zone. After 45 mintues he still had not contacted the complainant for the threats call which was obviously the most important call.

- (1) Attitude Towards Learning PC Jack can work towards meeting standards in this category by accepting ownership and responsibility for his mistakes. He has the desire to learn, he just needs to focus on correction not blame. This will continue to be addressed by the coach officer whenever it occurs and corrected immediately.
- (2) Federal Statutes PC Jack will need to invest some of his time in studying the elements of criminal offences and his arrest authorities and procedures. At each call for service that provides the opportunity, these elements will be discussed to ensure that PC Jack is aware of the circumstances and what options are available. While enroute to calls, he and his coach are already developing a game plan of how to handle the call based on dispatch information alone.

They were to have night shift make attempts to locate and arrest suspect; do up brief for this case and submit before going home. Brief to include; synopsis, photocopies of witness statements; summary of victim video statement; show cause hearing report. If not arrested then brief can be submitted for warrant. PC JACK entered a GOR which was not required that evening. He transcribed the video statement which was not required (after leaving the detachment and attending Staples Business Depot and purchasing headphones - to listen to the statement). PC JACK did not complete and submit a bail /warrant brief as he was directed to do by SGT FLINDALL. He requested CST BROCKLEY complete his brief synopsis for him. This reflects his poor time management skills, working on items he wasn't told to do an weren't required at the time

On the 17th July 2009 PC JACK was following up on an investigation that he wasn't asked to assist with, while he had his own investigations that required follow-up. PC JACK's notebook for this date refers to his follow-up relating to SP09152940. His task list at the time had a 2 frauds, a theft call, and a neighbour dispute that S/SGT CAMPBELL was requesting he follow-up on.

Instead of providing the officers the full details of the case, he with-held information causing these officers to provide advice in a certain manner. It subsequently came to light to these officers that he had manipulated the information and themselves. This has caused a significant level of distrust in PC JACK by his fellow officers.
- 10) Radio Communications PC JACK sounds confident in his radio use and is not an issue. PC JACK however does not follow proper radio protocal by notifying his dispatcher as to his daily activities and his whereabouts. He has also been found to often not answer his radio when the dispatcher is calling him. This was pointed out to him one day by a senior officer and was directed to call the dispatcher as they had been looking for him. This senior officer was met by an upset PC JACK who told the officer that he would call the dispatcher when he wanted to.
- 11) Police Vehicle Operations PC JACK was charged with a Highway Traffic Act related offence as a result of his driving behaviours. His emergency driving abilities was also called into question by a fellow officer.
- 12) Oral Communications PC JACK has repeatedly used a lack of understanding of a direction given to him as an excuse as to why tasks, assignments and investigations have been completed improperly. PC JACK indicates that he understands the directions, however uses lack of understanding as a reason for not completing tasks properly.
- 13) Analytical Thinking PC JACK has difficulty in envisioning cause and effect during his investigations. This is evident in PC JACK's thought process and problem solving abilities.
- 14) Attitudes Towards Learning PC JACK has an obvious ability to learn but is not willing to take responsibility for mistakes or accept any disappointments. He has been found to avoid an officer that has given him negative feedback. He has also been argumentative with officers that have given him direction and states that discipline is "humiliating".
- 15) Self Awareness PC JACK tends to hold grudges against those who have had to discuss issues with him that are not positive in nature towards him.

- 1) Personal Accountability Take responsibility for his own actions, learn from his mistakes and apply this to his future investigations that these deficiencies don't happen again. Do not blame fellow officers for deficiencies identified in himself.
- 2) Federal Statues PC JACK has already been made aware of the importance of reading rights to counsel, caution and applicable demands and this was rectified the next time he investigated an impaired driver. This is to be monitored by his coach officer during subsequent arrests. PC JACK should also be able to articulate the importance of rights to counsel and the various cautions and dentify when each would be used.

During each of PC JACK's criminal investigations, he should be expected to identify the facts in issue in each case, using a Criminal Code. All ciminal code informations should be completed by himself and read by his coach officer to verify accurateness.

- 3) Resolution When a problem is taking to long to resolve or you are unsure of how to resolve a problem call another officer or better assistance from fellow officers.
- 4) Follow Up Identify who is a key witness to form grounds for an offence, obtain the appropriate names and contact information and contain a detailed statement of those persons account of what happened as soon as possible. PC JACK needs to be monitored to ensure this is completed at the time of the complaint so subsequent investigations don't build on top of each other for follow-up to be completed.
- 5) Listening Skills PC JACK is expected to follow all instrictions given by his coach officer or his Sergeant without fault. Should PC JACK require clarification on an instruction he is to speak with his coach officer first, and if they are not available, their Sergeant. Should it be known that neither would be available during any given tour of duty, a senior member is to be identified for PC JACK to without clarification.
- 6) Planning and Organizing All officers working are at times required to stop what they are doing and take on a task which may be less or more important than the one they were actively working on. PC JACK needs to be able to take these tasks and work on them in also has to be implimented to get these tasks done. PC JACK's coach officer needs to review reportable vs non-reportable calls for service and their heirarchy.
- 7) Provincial Statues Review the Mental Health Act and identify to his coach officer what would be required to make an apprehension under the Mental Health Act. Other common Provincial Offence Act should also be reviewed to ensure an adequate working knowledge of each.
- 8) Self Confidence Take ownership for his mistakes, discipline or instruction and use these circumstances as learning opportunities to better yourself from them.
- 9) Respectful Relations See number 5 above.
- 10) Radio Communications Always advise the communications center of locations of vehicles stops and when out of the vehicle. Keep an ear to the radio for his Soft ID and respond in a timely manner. Use proper radio procedure using the status buttons on the radio.
- 11) Police Vehicle Operations PC JACK will be attending a police vehicle operations course with the OPP to evaluate his driving habits and capabilities.
- 12) Oral Communications PC JACK is expected to request clarification on information he receives from his coach officer or supervisor completed properly is no longer acceptable.

- 13) Analytical Thinking See #2 and #7 above.

- 15) Self Awareness PC JACK needs to understand that when issues are addressed with him, they are designed to be constructive in nature. Positive relations with his fellow officers need to be maintained in order to ensure a team environment on his Platoon.
- 16) Teamwork PC JACK needs to foster positive relations with his peers on shift. He and his coach need to work on fostering these relations by including fellow officers in such things as Ride spot checks.
- 17) Written PC JACK needs to work with his coach officer in learning how to prepare a concise, well written crown brief synopsis. All crown briefs need to be approved by his coach officer prior to being submitted to his Sergeant for review.
- 18) Deportment PC JACK needs to work at understanding that officers may correct things with his work in order to improve him as an officer, and not to look at it as a personal attack against him. In doing so, he should be able to better control his emotions without causing dissention.

On Friday 18 September 2009 I conducted a "Driver Competency Assessment" on Probationary Constable Michael Jack.

This assessment took place in the City of Kingston using an unmarked Chevrolet Malibu. A specially designed route was utilized to conduct the driver assessment and each driver navigates a broad range of situations to assess their driving abilities. These sessions take approximately 1.5 hours to complete. During this time, the driver is also exposed to internal / external "distracters" while their driving continues to be assessed.

During this assessment CST Jack was required to drive a complex route that varies in 3 distinct respects.

- Driving while rectiving directions from myself
- Driving while following a navigation sheet—and while doing this pointing out various house (building) numbers
- Driving while counting backwards by 3's.

Under these conditions I found some concerns with respect to Constable Jack's driving and have contacted Sgt Kent Faylor of the Provinces Acceptance of the provinces and the contacted some remedial driving opportunities.

Lam including a copy of the "Driver Competency Assessment". When Transport Canada initially developed the standards used in these assessments they tested numerous people to determine what the "average" driver is. A baseline (5) (average) was established through the scientific analysis of the data. Most professional drivers measure over (6). The goal of the OPP driving program is to have all of our drivers score 6 and above (i.e. above average.) Anything under 6 indicates areas where there is room for improvement. Although the report indicates that Michael is an above average driver—this is not the level that we are looking for with respect to our officers.

As such there are areas that have been identified in the assessment where improvement can take place. I will say that I found CST Jack to be cooperative but felt that he truly was under a fair amount of stress. There were a few situations that presented themselves during the assessment that, involved other drivers breaking the law (for example a 2nd car running a 4 way stop—we had the right of way and started to turn—and another older woman running a red etc). Cst Jack took appropriate measures to prevent collisions in both cases, but wanted me to know—emphatically" that the problems were caused by the other drivers. I discussed how the unexpected has to be expected when driving in the city and you really can not predict the actions of others.

- Speed slowing down assists in building in safety margins but at times a consistent speed is also required when "way finding" or self navigation. If a situation presents itself that requires some thought or reaction, the best course of action is to move your vehicle to a safe location and then determine what the best course of action is.
- Headway maintain proper distances between vehicles builds in escape routes this
 includes the vehicles in front of you but also includes vehicles following you more
 attention to the actions of vehicles following your vehicle can increase safety margins.
- Junctions interaction between the driver and the road system range in this area indicates room for more consistent performance.
- Dynamic Space Management increasing "space-cushion" between all vehicles around you.
- Driving with distractions as indicated by the Driver Competency Report, Probationary ('ST Jack should focus on his driving – especially when faced with competing demands for his attention. (Internal or external distractions).

It is interesting to note that when CST Jack was operating the vehicle, while counting backwards and faced with very busy and complex intersections he chose to focus "on the driving" and dropped counting until he had successfully navigated the situation—often communicating clearly with other drivers to accomplish what he needed to do. This is exactly what we want our people to do when faced with competing demands. By clevating driving and making it a priority our officers will be able to avoid problems while behind the wheel.

The Ontario Provincial Police Officer must be an above average driver and it is hoped we will set the standard for professional vehicle operation. Elevating "driving" to a higher priority will increase CST Jack's overall driving performance, allow him to increase his safety margins, and assist him in becoming a better driver. Some overall work with Sgt Kent Taylor will give him the

tools he needs to make better decisions, taster when dealing with situations that present themselves while operating a police schiele.

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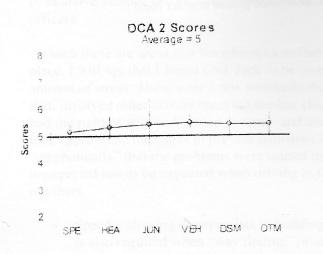

Driving Characteristics:

All drivers are scored on 4 discreet variables: speed, headway, junctions, vehicle control, and two composite ones: dynamic time management and dynamic space management. Overall Mr. Jack's driving was in the upper end of the average range. Drivers can use either space or time to control their environment. Mr. Jack uses time and space equally effectively (DSM - dynamic space management and DTM - dynamic time management). Both time and space were in the upper end of the average range. Mr. Jack was in the upper end of the average range on both junctions (JUN - junctions: understanding and use of the road system) and headway (HEA - headway; interaction with other road users). Mr. Jack was in the average range on speed (SPD - appropriateness of speed choices for road and traffic conditions). On vehicle (VEH - vehicle handling skills) Mr. Jack scored above average. With the exception of the high degree of variability found in junctions this driver was relatively consistent within individual measures as well's between all measures taken.

Task Loading Conditions:

During the drive Mr. Jack was scored while driving normally, while following a set of written navigational instructions and pointing out a predetermined set of addresses and while counting backwards by threes. Mr. Jack showed significant difference between driving normally and driving while wayfinding (multitasking), suggesting this driver needs to develop better strategies to deal with competing demands and should exercise caution if operating a motor vehicle while trying to complete a secondary task. Mr Jack showed no difference between driving normally and driving while counting backwards (internal distraction) suggesting that Mr. Jack has developed good control over his allocation of attentional resources.

Segments:

While each segment was approximately three minutes long, some segments were more complex than others based on a predetermined set of criteria. Mr. Jack showed no differences between driving in complex and simple environments suggesting that he can handle both complex and simple driving situations equally

Recommendations:

Mr. Jack is an average driver who could easily raise his overall driving performance. This driver should undergo some remediation to raise his overall safety margins as found in the driver competency assessment across all areas of driving and when driving with external distractors. This driver should be re-evaluated upon completion of remediation.

SPEED - SPD

Definition: Speed is the appropriate place of the circumstances and conditions at the time. Drivers taking into account the speed of the vehicle ahead. HEADWAY - HEA

Definition: The distance a vehicle has between itself and other moving objects. Traditionally headway referred to the space that a vehicle had in the direct torward field whereas headway for the purposes of this assessment refers to the relationships between the driver's vehicle and all other road users both that the driver initiates and ones that are initiated by other road users. Specifically the relationships between the driver and other road users are included in this measure.

JUNCTIONS - JUN

Definition: Intersections and all conflict points that exist in the road environment such as cross streets and driveways, etc. Conflict points for our purposes consist of any location where two or more objects or individuals traverse each other such as pedestrian crossovers and train crossings as well as roadway intersections. The interaction between the driver and the road system, their understanding of the rules of the road and the traffic control devices that defineate responsibility, and their ability to maximize safety margins through the speed and the placement of their vehicle are considered in this measure as is their vigilance in appropriate glance behaviour

VEHICLE HANDLING - VEH

Definition: Traditionally this variable has been called vehicle sympathy: the degree to which a driver is "in syne" with the vehicle. Vehicle balance on corners, independence of functioning skills and smoothness of handling the vehicle in terms of interacting with the controls are considered in this measure. Smoothness of operation is an essential component of this measure in conjunction with control of the vehicle under varying conditions and speeds.

DYNAMIC SPACE MANAGEMENT - DSM

Definition: This variable is most closely aligned with 'space-cushion' or 'safety envelope' in the literature. The degree to which a driver (a) is aware of their surroundings, (b) understands the implications of the time-space relationship and (c) optimizes space to the best of their ability for themselves and other road users. Drivers who score higher on this measure use space well as a method of optimizing their safety margins. Creating space for both their own safety and the safety of others is critical, particularly for smaller vehicle visibility. A driver's ability to maintain an optimum space independent of other road users is considered important as well as the ability to separate out hazards and deal with each as an isolated event. In these cases higher scores will be in line with the driver's ability to choose the less risky option in a complex environment and/or situation. This is a composite measure comprised of speed, headway, and junctions as well as the sophistication to use space to maximize all of these.

DYNAMIC TIME MANAGEMENT - DTM

Definition. In the Interacture this variable is most closely aligned to eye-lead-time or situation awareness. The degree to which a driver (a) is aware of their surroundings, (b) understands the implications of the time-space relationship and (c) optimizes time to the best of their ability. Drivers who score higher on this measure use time as a method of increasing their margins by having more time to make decisions and more time to view the environment. Drivers who see and respond to situations developing ahead of the vehicle receive higher scores while those who are continually being trapped by a lack of time will be scored lower on this variable. This is a composite measure comprised of speed, headway, functions and traffic control devices. Inherent in time management is the notion of judging motion and velocity and the ability to time maneuvers to coincide in space.

Preamble: In early May 2009, I advised Sgt. Flindall that I did not feel I was getting the proper coaching and that I felt I had no one to go to for help. He acknowledged my concerns and explained to me that it was the result of the mismanagement of human resources at the detachment and that Cst. Shaun Filman was not supposed to be my coach officer in the first place and that he was assigned to be my coach shortly prior to my reporting at the detachment. I was Cst. Filman's 3rd probationary back-to-back, he just had a son and as the result his mind was elsewhere. I advised Sgt. Flindall that I was concerned about my probationary period progress and that I did not want to jeopardize my probationary period because of the mismanagement of resources, which was obviously beyond my control. Sgt. Flindall reassured me that this was not going to happen on his shift. Sgt. Flindall advised me that Cst. Filman was going to continue to be my official coach officer and as such, will continue to be responsible for writing my evaluations. While Cst. Payne was going to be my "go-to" person and was going to assists me with work. Obviously, this did not

My PCS-066P for month 2 (evaluation period 09 Jan 2009 – 09 Mar 2009) was presented to me by Sgt. Flindall on April 26, 2009. There were 3 "Does Not Meet Requirements" ratings and 3 work improvement plans. The PCS-066P was overdue by a month and a half. Sgt. Flindall advised me that this was his fault and reassured me that this was not going to happen again.

My PCS-066P for month 3 (evaluation period 09 Mar 2009 – 09 Apr 2009) was presented to me by Sgt. Flindall on April 26, 2009 together with PCS-066P for month 2.

My PCS-066P for month 4 (evaluation period 09 Apr 2009 – 09 May 2009) was presented to me by Sgt. Flindall on May 14, 2009.

My PCS-066P for month 5 (evaluation period 09 May 2009 – 09 June 2009) was presented to me by Sgt. Flindall on August 19, 2009, which was overdue by two months.

On August 19, 2009 I had a meeting with S/Sgt. Campbell and Sgt. Flindall with OPPA representative, Cst. Anderson sitting in on it. At the meeting I was informed that I was being re-assigned to another platoon with another coach officer and that I would report back for duty on September 9' 2009; after my vacation that commences on August 20, 2009 at 18:00 hrs. Further, I was informed by Sgt. Flindall that he was going to give me two more 233-10 and that it would be reflected in my next evaluation.

On August 20, 2009 shortly before noon, I got a call in reference to a suspected impaired driver (SP09191712). I subsequently intercepted and arrested the driver for impaired operation of motor vehicle (the driver's breath test result was 272 BAC) and was busy dealing with the prisoner and the paper work all afternoon. At 17:40 hrs (which was 20 minutes prior to the end of my shift), I was presented by Sgt. Flindall yet again, my PCS-066P for month 6 (evaluation period 09 June 2009 – 09 August 2009) along with two 233LO and was told to review and sign them "hopefully" before 18:00 hrs. Final The work improvement plans were not there and I felt I was being slammed with even thing a lationce.

At 18:00 hrs I called D/Cst. Karen German, who is the President of the 8 Branch OPPA and sought advice. D/Cst. German advised me that I did not have to sign anything at the time and advised me she was going to look into my case. I did not sign any of the forms Sgt. Flindall gave me. I told him that I needed more time to review the PCS-066P and that I wanted an OPPA rap to look at them as well. I also told him that I would sign the 233-10 if he ordered me to do so, to which he replied, "Nope" and put "Refused to Sign" instead of my signature. That was the end of our meeting that concluded at approximately 18:10 hrs.

On August 21, 2009 at approximately 10:00 hrs I spoke with Cst. Anderson on the phone. He advised me that it was only fair for me to have some time to go over my evaluation and that I did not have to sign either 233-10 or the PCS-066P on such a short notice. I advised him that I spoke with D/Cst. German and asked him to advise S/Sgt. Campbell of the situation, to which he replied he would.

Thave been working on my own since April 2009. During the busy summer months, there have been months of occasions when I worked alone in my zone throughout the entire day. Also, during my evaluation period (09 June 2009 to 09 August 2009) I had a total of 40 reportable calls for service as a reporting officer and 10 non-reportable. In addition I had 5 calls for service in which I took part either as an assisting officer, an arresting officer, or a fingerprinting officer. During the same time period (09 June 2009 assisting officer, an arresting officer, or a fingerprinting officer, Cst. Filman, and my "go-to" person, Cst. To 20 August 2009) my zone partners, which were my coach officer, Cst. Filman, and my "go-to" person, Cst. Payne, had a total of 37 reportable calls for service together, 20 and 17, respectively; and 35 non-reportable, 10 and 25, respectively.

Provincial Statutes Rating: Does Not Meet Requirements

The narrative is true except for the fact that I did not make the decision to take the female to the hospital for an evaluation. I was the first one on scere, followed by Cst. Crowder, then by Cst. D'Amico and Cst. Moran. Upon arrival, Cst. D'Amico said that she knew the female and that she was crazy. After Cst. D'Amico and Cst. Moran cleared the scene, I was not sure how to clear the call off and that is why I sought advice and Cst. Crowder, who has got 20% years of service on me. When Cst. Crowder asked me what I would do, I advised Cst. Crowder that though I remembered studying police apprehension authorities under the Mental Health Act at the Ontario Police College, this was my first call of that particular nature. Cst. Crowder explained to me how the call should have been handled and cleared off. I therefore disagree with the "Does Not Meet Requirements" rating as I sought and followed advice of a senior officer.

Federal Statutes Rating: Does Not Meet Requirements

SP09178964 - After the apprehension and the arrest of the 4 male suspects, Sgt. Flindall asked all the officers at the scene if anyone wanted to lead the investigation. No one volunteered. I had not handled criminal cases of this nature before yet said that I could do it if I got assistance with handling the case. Sgt. Flindall advised me that it would be a team effort in which everybody would take on a piece of work. Upon arrival at the detachment I found out through Niche RMS that the investigation was assigned to me. In regards to me not trusting a supervisor or a senior member with direction stems from the fact that I had been reprimanded before for following directions from a senior officer (see Listening Skills) as well as for not asking for help when I needed it. My coach officer was not available at the time to assist me with the investigation and the required paper work. Therefore, at that point after everything that had gone on, I did not know who to seek advice from or who I could trust. Further to this, I asked Sgt. Flindall through email once and verbally 3 times for a copy of his notes from the evening's event, as Sgt. Flindall arrested one male suspect at the scene and I needed his notes to complete the crown brief synopsis. Sgt. Flindall acknowledged my requests but never gave me nis notes. I was therefore unable to complete the crown brief synopsis prior to going on vacation on August 20, 2009. Fadvised Sgt. Flindall that I was willing to come to work during my time off to complete the investigation, to which he replied he wanted me to have a vacation and that he would take care of the investigation and ordered me to surrender to him the 4 crown briefs that I had put together, which I dia.

Listening Skills Rating: Does Not Meet Requirements

SP09087157 - With respect to the handling of the Fraud investigation, see Follow-Up Orientation.

SP09164458 - On July 23, 2009 at 18:40 hrs. was ordered by Sgt. Flindall to work on overtime to complete the Criminal Harassment case I was assigned to work on earlier that day. First and foremost I was 13 hours into my day shift when the order to stay at the detachment to continue working on overtime was given. Second, I had not handled criminal cases of this nature before and therefore lacked the necessary skills or experience to handle the investigation on my own in such a short time frame. Sgt. Flindall gave me a set of instructions on a piece of paper to follow and advised me that the night shift were going to assist me. Further, Sgt. Flindall advised me that the night shirt supervisor (21C) Cst. Hanna had been advised to track the accused down and arrest him. Despite being exhausted, not having eaten all day and not having the experience to complete the required paper work in a given time frame, I did not dispute Sgt. Flindall's order and stayed at work. I took an energy pill to keep me awake, got a meal from Wendy's and a set of headphones from Staples and continued working. . dio transcribe the video statement and put the general occurrence report as it helped me to determine and put the facts-in-issue in writing. I then photocopied my notes and the evidence provided by the complainants and at around 22:00 hrs asked Cst. Brokley, who was on light duties that night, to assist me with putting Crown Brief Synopsis as I was mentally and physically exhausted and could no longer comprehend what I was doing. Cst. Brokley advised me he could not do that as Crown Brief Synopsis should be written by the investigating ornicer and instead offered me his help with the preparation of the PTAs. I advised est. Broker that this is not what Sgt. Fiindall rold me to do and showed him a piece of paper with Sgt. Flindaid's instructions. Cst. Brokley in turn advised me that since the

accused did not have a criminal record, he could be arrested and released on a PTA and that he was going to prepare the PTA for me. At around 23:00 hrs I called Cst. Hanna on the on-duty sergeant's phone and inquired whether the accused had been arrested. Cst. Hanna advised me that the last message he got was not to arrest the accused and that he did not dispatch any officers from the night shift to arrest the accused. I advised him that this not what Sg., Flindall advised me and that I expected the night shift to help me. Cst. Hanna in turn advised me that this was "builshit" and that the accused should have been contacted over the phone and asked to attend the detachment earlier in the evening to turn himself in. Cst. Hanna further advised me that he was on a call enroute to Bancroft and could not be of any assistance to me at the time. In light of this information. Cst. Brokley advised me to send an email to the detachment in reference to the occurrence, should the accused be arrested overnight and that he was going to prepare the PTA and leave two copies in my diary slcf. I sent an email as advised and at around midnight obtained న్/Sgt. Campbell's permission, who frappened to be at the detachment at the time, to go home and come back the following morning (Friday, July 24, 2009) to work overtime to complete the investigation. When S/Sgt. Campbell looked at me he told me, 'Go home Mike, you are spinning wheels now". Heft the detachment at around 01:00 hrs and came back to work in the morning at around 10:00 hrs. The accused was not arrested overnight. With a tresh mind I finalized the Crown Brief Synopsis. Though Cst. Brokley did prepare the PTA and left two copies in my diary slot, I had to prepare the PTA from scratch as it was erroneous and was not even saved in the Niche RMS. At around noon, I learned from the complainant's husband that the accused was employed as a land surveyor and was supposed to be at work at a road construction site in the vicinity of the Peterborough County OPP detachment that day. I sought advice from the day shift supervisor (2!C) Cst. Postma now to handle the arrest (I only had one arrest, for Over 80, on my own prior to that day) and then attempted to locate the accused. At the construction site I located a coworker of the accused and learned from hir i that the accused had left for the day. I was subsequently able to get hold of the accused on the prione at this father's place and requested him to attend the detachment. At the detachment larrested him on the charge of Criminal Harassment and released him on PTA. At around 18:30 hrs I attended his residence and in his presence seized his 15 registered firearms under Sec. 117.04 CC. I got assistance from the night shift with the longing of the 15 seized firearms and concluded my overtime day shift at 23:00 nrs. I disagree with this rating as I lacked the necessary knowledge to deal with a criminal case of this nature, I was mentally and physically exhausted and felt abandoned. Once again, I took the advice of the senior officer and therefore I was reassured I was doing the right thing.

Radio Communications

Rating: Does Not Meet Requirements

SP09152940 - SP09158515 - With respect to the "follow-up", see Self-Awareness.

Resolution Ratings Doe Not Maket Requirements

The narrative is only partially true as first Lactended the 'stand-by and keep the peace" call on my own as to the best of my knowledge at the lime, all other zone units were tied up with other calls for service. Second, I was unaware that one of the involved parties contacted the PCC and requested another officer to attend. When I realized things were not propressing, called Cst. Payne and requested back-up. Cst. Payne advised me that she was sending Cst. Filmac to assist me. When Cst. Filman arrived, he resolved the matter.

Follow-Up Orientation Rating: Does Not Meet Requirements

SP05087157 - First and foremost; my understanding on the investigation was that I was to assist in the investigation and not to lead it. In proof of this, in my evaluation report for month 4 (09 April 2009 to 09 May 2009) in the Analytical Thinking section Cst. Filman indicated that I completed a detailed investigation including a photo line-up and had since turned the investigation over to the regional intelligence officer. I was later advised by Sgt. Flindall that the investigation was mine and that I was supposed to lead it to completion. Due to the complexity of the investigation (for my level of experience) I asked Sgt. Flindall for assistance and he advised me that Cst. Payne was going to assist me with it. On July 18, 2009, Cst. Payne and myself sat down to look at what I had done in regards to the investigation and what remained to be done. Cst. Payne quickly proof read my General Occurrence Report, advised me that property items needed to be added to Niche RMS, synopsis of the video statement completed, crown brief synopsis completed and all my notes photocopied. I got no more than half-an-hour altogether of Cst. Payne assistance with the case. I did transcribe the witness video statement contrary to Cst. Payne instruction just to prepare a summary of it. However, ourng the transcription, I discovered that the actual fraudulent transaction was rung through by another person (a cashier) and that was something neither I nor Cst. Payne was aware of. While I was present during the interview of the Customer Service Representative (CSR), who serviced the accused and was the witness to the traud, when D, Cst. Dawson conducted the interview, my understating was that I was the assisting officer at the investigation and therefore I did not intervene in the photo lineup procedure and in the questioning of the CSR. When however, I transcribed the video statement verbatim, I learned that there was a cashier who physically rung the fraudulent transaction through. Had I not transcribed the video statement verbatim, no one would have known that there was another key witness to the event and that her statements needed to be obtained.
